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this book introduces the reader to basic issues related to the phenomenon of american cinema it looks at american film history from the 1890s through the spring of 2020 but it does not always explore this history in a purely chronological way in fact it is not strictly speaking a history rather it is a cultural history which focuses more on topics and issues than on what happened when it begins with a profile of classical hollywood cinema as a unique economic industrial aesthetic and cultural institution it considers the experience of moviegoing the nature of hollywood storytelling and the roles played by the studio system the star system and film genres in the creation of a body of work that functions not only as entertainment but as a portrait of the relationship between an american national identity and an industrialized mass culture that has slowly evolved over the past century this book assumes that the reader has little or no formal training in film history theory or aesthetics it presents fairly basic concepts in such a way as to encourage discussion not so much of individual films but of films in general for this reason the book concentrates on large groupings of films on genres topics and periods of film history this textbook differs from the more traditional histories of the cinema for certain specific and important reasons over the past fifty years the field of film study has undergone a tremendous transformation this change has been spearheaded by the work of a new generation of scholars who challenge the traditional way in which film history has been written and taught introduction to film courses that fifty years ago taught film as art drew heavily upon the approaches of new criticism contemporary film courses now teach film not only as art but also as film and they attempt to situate film as an art form within a larger industrial economic social and cultural context they rely heavily on cultural studies new historicism psychoanalysis and other contemporary critical disciplines film history texts have changed over the years as well in the past histories consisted of simple chronological accounts of who did what and what happened when and of the stories of great men sic and their achievements and of straightforward accounts of the influence of technology and economics on the course of a history

that unfolds in a linear fashion up to the present more recently film scholars have begun to rewrite these traditional histories creating what thomas elsaesser refers to as the new film history at its best this history is driven by a sophisticated theoretically informed revisionism it simply refuses to accept the easy answers to basic historical questions that had been offered up by past historians with the initial publication of *American Cinema American Culture* in 1994 the methods and discoveries of the new film history were applied to an introductory level text surveying the history of the american cinema

this book examines the role that the american film institute afi had in supporting experimental and independent cinema at a key moment of change in the history of american film weaving a rich historical narrative ramirez argues that the cold war struggle for cultural supremacy motivated the creation of the federally funded afi exploring the intersection of business interests and political objectives ramirez demonstrates how the afi s approach to experimental and independent cinema was marked by an interest in promoting innovative aesthetics and protecting the creative freedom of filmmakers but lacked the attention to distribution and exhibition that would strengthen the viability of experimental and independent filmmaking as professional practices scholars of film history and american studies will find this work particularly useful

the cinema has been the pre eminent popular art form of the 20th century in cinemas of the world james chapman examines the relationship between film and society in the modern world film as entertainment medium film as a reflection of national cultures and preoccupations film as an instrument of propaganda he also explores two interrelated

issues that have recurred throughout the history of cinema the economic and cultural hegemony of hollywood on the one hand and on the other the attempts of film makers elsewhere to establish indigenous national cinemas drawing on their own cultures and societies chapman examines the rise to dominance of hollywood cinema in the silent and early sound periods he discusses the characteristic themes of american movies from the depression to the end of the cold war especially those found in the western and film noir genres that are often used as vehicles for exploring issues central to us society and politics he looks at national cinemas in various european countries in the period between the end of the first world war and the end of the second which all exhibit the formal and aesthetic properties of modernism the emergence of the so called new cinemas of europe and the wider world since 1960 are also explored chapman is a tough thinking original writer an engaging excellent piece of work david lancaster film and history

written by ed sikov this useful study guide has also been updated including a new chapter on horror and science fiction the guide introduces each topic in american cinema american culture with an explanatory overview written in more informal language than the textbook suggests screenings and readings and contains self tests so students can check their level of learning before taking exams

from the earliest days of public outrage over indecent nickelodeon shows americans have worried about the power of the movies the eleven essays in this book examine nearly a

century of struggle over cinematic representations of sex crime violence religion race and ethnicity revealing that the effort to regulate the screen has reflected deep social and cultural schisms in addition to the editor contributors include daniel czitrom marybeth hamilton garth jowett charles lyons richard maltby charles musser alison m parker charlene regester ruth vasey and stephen vaughn together they make it clear that censoring the movies is more than just a reflex against indecency however defined whether censorship protects the vulnerable or suppresses the creative it is part of a broader culture war that breaks out recurrently as americans try to come to terms with the market the state and the plural society in which they live

once derided as senseless entertainment movies have gradually assumed a place among the arts raymond haberski s provocative and insightful book traces the trajectory of this evolution throughout the twentieth century from nickelodeon amusements to the age of the financial blockbuster haberski begins by looking at the barriers to film s acceptance as an art form including the chicago motion picture commission hearings of 1918 1920 one of the most revealing confrontations over the use of censorship in the motion picture industry he then examines how movies overcame the stigma attached to popular entertainment through such watershed events as the creation of the museum of modern art s film library in the 1920s the arguments between pauline kael and andrew sarris s heralded a golden age of criticism and haberski focuses on the roles of kael sarris james agee roger ebert and others in the creation of cinephilia described by susan sontag as born of the conviction that cinema was an art unlike any other this love of cinema centered on coffee houses universities art theaters film festivals and of course foreign films the lively debates over the place of movies in american culture began to wane in the 1970s haberski places the blame on the loss of cultural authority and on the increasing irrelevance of the meaning of art he concludes with a persuasive call for the re emergence of a middle ground between art and entertainment something more complex ambiguous and vexing something worth thought

this book looks at aspects of the relationship between british and american cinema covering the period from the first world war until the 1960s it deals with the ways in which the two industries have sought to intervene in the affairs of the other and examines how british subject matter drawn from history literature drama biography has had a place in the american film since the earliest days the history of the british cinema its institutions and its films has been closely intertwined with the history of the american cinema since films were first made and viewed in the late 19th century in many ways it has been a one sided relationship with hollywood exerting a powerful influence on the british film industry shap

introduces the major cultural and intellectual trends of the decade by introducing and assessing the development of the primary cultural forms namely fiction poetry and drama music and performance film and radio and visual art and design a fifth chapter focuses on the unprecedented rise in the 1920s of leisure and consumption

although films rarely act as mirror reflections of everyday reality they are nevertheless powerful cultural expressions of the dreams and desires of the american public this work provides a complete post world war ii survey of american cinema and its often complex and contradictory values

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
