the american health care system is a unique mix of public and private programs that critics argue has produced a two tier system one for the rich and the other for the poor that delivers dramatically unequal care and leaves millions of americans seriously underinsured or with no coverage at all this book examines the root causes of the inequalities of the american health care system and discusses various policy alternatives it systematically documents the demands on and the performance of our health care system for different population groups as defined on the basis of gender women age children race and ethnicity african americans hispanics native americans and residence in high poverty areas rural and inner city locales for each population the book documents historical and demographic profile data on health status aspects of inequality including access quality of care and endemic cultural and lifestyle issues affecting health policies laws and programs relevant to health care and indicators of improvement or negative trends

the american health care industry has undergone such dizzying transformations since the 1960s that many patients have lost confidence in a system they find too impersonal and ineffectual is their distrust justified and can confidence be restored david dranove a leading health care economist tackles these and other key questions in the first major economic and historical investigation of the field focusing on the doctor patient relationship he begins with the era of the independently practicing physician epitomized by marcus welby the

beloved father figure doctor in the 1960s television show of the same name who disappeared with the growth of managed care. Dr. House guides consumers in understanding the rapid developments of the health care industry and offers timely policy recommendations for reforming managed care as well as advice for patients making health care decisions. The book covers everything from start up troubles with the first managed care organizations to attempts at government regulation to the mergers and quality control issues facing mcos today. It also reflects on how difficult it is for patients to shop for medical care up until the 1970s. Patients looked to autonomous physicians for recommendations on procedures and hospitals a process that relied more on the patient's trust of the physician than on facts and resulted in skyrocketing medical costs. Newly emerging mcos have tried to solve the shopping problem by tracking the performance of care providers while obtaining discounts for their clients. Many observers accuse mcos of caring more about cost than quality and argue for government regulation. Dr. House however believes that market forces can eventually achieve quality care and cost control but first mcos must improve their ways of measuring provider performance. Medical records must be made more complete and accessible a task that need not compromise patient confidentiality and patients must be willing to seek and act on information about the best care available. Dr. House argues that patients can regain confidence in the medical system and even come to trust mcos but they will need to rely on both their individual doctors and their own consumer awareness.

Take Me Home is a vivid reminder that children need long term caregivers who can help them develop and thrive when troubled parents can't change enough to permit reunification. Alternative permanency options must be pursued and no reform will matter for the hundreds of thousands of children entering foster care each year in America unless their experience of out of home care is considerably better than the one many now experience. Take Me Home offers prescriptions for policy change and strategies for parents, social workers and judges struggling with permanency decisions. Readers will come away reinvigorated in their thinking about how to get children to the homes they need.

This book examines the current state of American health care using a social science lens to focus on the interdependent intercultural economic and communication aspects of access and delivery. This text explores how the cultures of health care organizations, health professions, governments and capitalism as well as communication all contribute to a disease focused economically driven technology centered health care system. It seeks to understand 21st century health care from a macro level view based on historical realizations and the current plethora of interdependent but self serving realities that provide few if any incentives for organizational collaboration and change. The fact that the most expensive health care system in the world does not provide the healthiest outcomes is a driving force in this exploration. By reflecting on American values and beliefs regarding health care from philosophical, clinical, communication and cost perspectives this text is designed to encourage an organizational transformation at every level from government to providers to patients. This comprehensive survey is an important guide for those studying or working in health care professions as well as health care policy and administration. It should also be of interest to any reader who seeks to better understand U.S. health care policy from social science, economic and or health communication perspectives.

The United States spends greatly more per person on health care than any other country but the evidence shows that care is often poor and inappropriate despite expenditures of 1.7 trillion dollars in 2003 and growing substantially each year. Services remain fragmented and poorly coordinated and more than 46 million people are uninsured. Why can't America with its vast array of resources, sophisticated technologies, superior medical research and educational institutions and talented health care professionals produce higher quality care and better outcomes? In the truth about health care, David Mechanic explains how health care in America has evolved in ways that favor a myriad of economic, professional and political interests over those of patients. participant researcher teacher and consultant to the public and private sectors mechanic examines the strengths and weaknesses of our system and how it has evolved he pays special attention to areas often neglected in policy discussions such as the loss of public trust in medicine the tragic state of long term care and the relationship of mental health to health care for anyone who has been frustrated by uncoordinated health networks insurance denials and other obstacles to obtaining appropriate care this book will provide a refreshing and frank look at the system s current and future dilemmas mechanic s thoughtful roadmap describes how health plans healthcare professionals policymakers and consumer groups can work together to improve access quality fairness and health outcomes in america david mechanic is director of the institute for health health care policy and aging research at rutgers university and the national program director of the robert wood johnson foundation investigator awards in health policy research he has been elected to the national academy of sciences and to the institute of medicine he was coeditor of policy challenges in modern health care
