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the appeal to our obligations to future generations is one of the most forceful emotional and effective arguments available to politicians and citizens and is the cornerstone of all modern policies aimed at sustainable development yet the exact nature and extent of these obligations are unclear who owes what to whom exactly and why this highly accessible book provides an extensive and comprehensive overview of current research and theory about why and how we should protect future generations it exposes how and why the interests of people today and those of future generations are often in conflict and what can be done it rebuts critical concepts such as parfit's non identity paradox and becker's denial of any possibility of intergenerational justice the core of the book is the lucid application of a veil of ignorance to derive principles of intergenerational justice which show that our duties to posterity are stronger than is often supposed tremmel's approach demands that each generation both consider and improve the well being of future generations to measure the well being of future generations tremmel employs the human development index rather than the metrics of utilitarian subjective happiness the book thus answers in detailed concrete terms the two most important questions of every theory of intergenerational justice what

to sustain and how much to sustain ultimately this book provides a theory of intergenerational justice that is both intellectually robust and practical with wide applicability to law policy economics climate change and all other contexts that affect future generations

can people alive now have duties to future generations the unborn millions if so what do we owe them what does justice mean in an intergenerational context both between people who will coexist at some point and between generations that will never overlap in this book axel gosseries provides a forensic examination of these issues comparing and analyzing various views about what we owe our successors he discusses links between justice and sustainability and looks at the implications of the fact that our successors preferences are heavily influenced by what we will actually leave them and by the education they receive he also points to how these theoretical considerations apply to real life issues ranging from pension reform and brexit to biodiversity and the climate crisis he ends by outlining how intergenerational considerations may translate into institutional design anyone grappling with the dilemmas of our obligations to the future from students and scholars to policy makers and active citizens will find this an invaluable theoretical and practical guide to this moral and political minefield

focusing on contemporary social issues the environmental crisis population growth and demographic change and the question of whether reparations are owed to indigenous peoples this study presents a theory of intergenerational justice that gives citizens duties to past and future generations and explains what relationships between contemporary generations count as fair

can we do justice to human beings who do not yet exist the study examines substantiations and consequences of justice towards future people after a detailed analysis of egalitarian consequentialist and reciprocity based theories of intergenerational justice the author sketches an alternative model of intergenerational justice that is based on normative individualism thus intergenerational justice takes both its starting point and its ultimate point of justification at the individual being not at a generation as a collective entity intergenerational justice thereby proves not to be a uniform principle but is differentiated into plural relations showing the ramifications of intergenerational justice in a particular real life case the theory is then applied to evaluate the german constitutional law on state debt in this context intergenerational justice yields the general illegitimacy of consumptively used long term public debt

climate change poses questions of intergenerational justice but some of its features make it difficult to determine whether we have obligations of climate justice to future generations this book offers a novel argument justifying the present generation s obligations to future people livia ester luzzatto shows that we have intergenerational obligations because many of our actions are based on presuppositions about future people when agents engage in such intergenerational actions they also acquire an obligation to recognise those future people as agents within their principles of justice and with that a duty to respect their agency and autonomy intergenerational challenges and climate justice also offers a way to circumvent the problems of non identity and non existence its approach overcomes the intergenerational challenges of climate change by meeting three necessary criteria providing ways to cope with uncertainty dealing with the complexity of climate change and including future people for their own sake the author meets these criteria by adopting an action centred methodology that grounds our obligations of justice on the presuppositions of activity this robust framework can be used to justify increased climate action and the greater inclusion of future oriented policies in current decision making this book will be of great interest to academics and students concerned with the issues of climate and intergenerational justice

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in intergenerational equity environmental and cultural concerns the editors have produced an important broad based volume on intergenerational equity the authors explore the principle of intergenerational equity in many dimensions from the theoretical to the practical while the primary focus is on intergenerational equity in the context of environmental resources and cultural heritage the principle is also addressed in a broad array of other contexts the final section of the volume considers intergenerational justice as it applies to indigenous peoples genocide migration sovereign wealth funds and foreign investment the chapters also provide a critical analysis of the issues and a consideration of the difficulties in implementing intergenerational equity

this book presents a contractualist theory of intergenerational justice that avoids deficiencies in existing igj theories e g the non identity problem and the under defining of generations the inability of social contract theory to provide a thorough accounting of justice between generations has been called an embarrassment and rightly so that said serious attempts have been made from a variety of contract perspectives to rectify the approach's shortcomings in the area of intergenerational justice one of the most

prominent contract theorists John Rawls attempted to address justice between generations in his theory via his just savings principle but both versions of it were met with stinging criticism as the climate crisis among other challenges presses the issue of justice for future generations the authors believe that intergenerational justice is something that social contract theory should and can address specifically they present a Rawlsian approach that begins with a clarified understanding of what is meant by generations and proceeds from there to modify generational knowledge constraints in the original position the authors then draw upon the concept of indirect reciprocity to round out an argument for a Rawlsian principle of justice between generations intergenerational fair equality of opportunity they then apply their intergenerational justice theory to five major public policy areas

in anticipation that future generations will charge the present generations with recklessness by exacerbating climate change this dissertation grapples with the proposition that future earthlings have a moral claim of justice on us questions to be addressed are these what does justice require of the current generation in tackling climate change to safeguard the wellbeing of future generations how can the current generation achieve a just relationship with those to come in the context of the atrocious violations caused by global climate change policy discussions of intergenerational justice predominantly frame the matter as one of distributive justice how to distribute the benefits and burdens of climate change policy across generations this dissertation demonstrates theories of distributive justice have the potential to be productive however an important aspect that needs substantial treatment the aspect of remediation is undertreated in theories of distributive justice i argue that restorative justice can operate alongside the theories of distributive justice to better address the demands of intergenerational dimensions of climate change this dissertation gives substance to ways the restorative justice framework can operate intergenerationally restorative justice can address not only environmental crime but also the harms that future generations will experience because of climate change i demonstrate the unique contributions of the restorative justice framework to the discussion of intergenerational justice

this book presents an argument for environmental human rights as the basis of intergenerational environmental justice it argues that the rights to clean air water and soil should be seen as the environmental human rights of both present and future generations it presents several new conceptualizations central to the development of theories of both human rights and justice including emergent human rights reflexive reciprocity as the foundation of justice and a communitarian foundation for human rights that both protects the rights of future generations and makes possible an international consensus on human rights beginning with environmental human rights in the process of making the case for environmental human rights the book surveys and contributes to the entire fields of human rights theory and environmental justice

in this timely book Alexandra Harrington examines the legal and policy terms contained in transitional justice mechanisms through the lenses of intergenerational equity and justice and the impact on current and future generations based on these findings she offers a new definition of transitional justice that focuses on generational incorporation to ensure a durable equitable and just peace
