this accessible textbook provides a clear and practical introduction to phonology the study of sound patterns

interest in morphology has revived in recent years and the yearbook of morphology has provided great support for this revival with its articles on topics that are central to the current theoretical debates the yearbook of morphology 1997 focuses on the relationship between morphology and other modules of the grammar especially phonology syntax and semantics among the basic questions discussed are how does morphology differ from other modules of the grammar syntax in particular what are the possible forms of interaction between the modules how does semantics constrain formal variation in morphology the evidence adduced is derived from a variety of languages audience theoretical descriptive and historical linguists morphologists phonologists and psycholinguists

this volume of new work by prominent phonologists goes to the heart of current debates in phonological and linguistic theory should the explanation of phonological variety be constraint or rule based and in the light of the resolution of this question how in the mind does phonology interface with other components of the grammar the book includes contributions from leading proponents of both sides of the argument and an extensive introduction setting out the history nature and more general linguistic implications of current phonological theory

combining a collection of data on phonological acquisition with attention to optimality theory this book blends the studies of linguistics psycholinguistics and speech language pathology in reference to phonological development it also contains an evaluation of competing

theories and presents a view of non linear phonology

over the past 30 years formal approaches to second and additional language acquisition sla have made great advances in understanding the nature of the multilingual mind however it is undeniable that most of the research into the speech of learners and multilinguals has focused on more phonetic rather than phonological approaches these phonetic approaches among other contributions enrich our understanding of surface variation in the production and perception of various sound phenomena complementing these phonetic approaches phonological approaches seek to describe mental representations that connect sound and meaning and may tell us about both universal and language specific patterns in non native development and use studies undertaking these objectives however are comparatively scarce in the literature particularly those whose empirical examination of sla seek to further develop complex linguistic models of the mental representation of phonology and to inform phonological theory

this volume brings together leading scholars from africa europe the americas and beyond to provide a detailed account of the languages of the bantu family which cover an area from cameroon and kenya in the north to south africa in the south the bantu family is part of the niger congo phylum and one of the world s biggest language groups comprising around 500 languages the family includes major languages with large numbers of speakers such as zulu kinyarwanda and swahili the most widely spoken and taught african language as well as many community languages and several endangered languages bantu languages feature prominently in the complex and multilingual language ecologies that are characteristic of the linguistic situation in much of africa and they provide rich evidence for the study of theoretical and comparative linguistics language contact and language change they play an important role in education commerce culture and artistic expression in the media and public discourse in governance and social justice and are central to the future of the

continent and the well being of its communities the first part of the oxford guide to the bantu languages provides background and context with chapters exploring the history of research in the field language and prehistory in bantu speaking africa and typology and variation chapters in the second part offer broad comparative overviews of bantu phonology morphology syntax semantics and pragmatics socio and applied linguistics before parts iii vii cover more specific topics in bantu linguistics across a variety of subfields ranging from structural issues such as the augment and melodic tone to historical and sociolinguistic topics such as bantu languages in the diaspora and language policy and standardization the chapters in the final part offer individual structural overviews of a range of languages from across the bantu speaking area the book will be an essential resource for students and researchers specializing in the bantu languages and for typologists and comparative linguists more broadly

this study combines a descriptive and theoretical presentation of kɔnni a gur language of northern ghana it presents an optimality theory analysis of the entire phonological system the descriptions are separated from the formal analyses in order to facilitate use by both descriptivists and theoreticians morphology is described including the noun class system reduplicative agentive nouns noun adjective complexes nominal derivations and various verbal aspectual suffixes major sections are included on consonants vowels and tone the volume also includes a brief syntax sketch co occurrence restrictions phoneme frequency counts measurements of segment durations and vowel formants and seven appendices of data selected notes of interest some phonology is limited to only certain noun classes the 9 vowel atr vowel system and diphthongization are integrally related certain vowels assimilate only across consonants having the same place feature tonal perturbations require four different underlying representations for different nouns which have a surface lh tone true tonal polarity is distinct from dissimilation two cases of syntax phonology interface are demonstrated michael cahill ph d linguistics the ohio state university 1999 has been with sil since 1982 and worked on site with kɔnni speakers from 1986 to 1993 he was a member of the isa s

committee on endangered languages and their preservation from 2001 2003 chairing it in 2003 he is an adjunct faculty member of the university of texas at arlington and of the graduate institute of applied linguistics and is currently based in dallas as the international linguistics coordinator of sil
