according to the sociologist c wright mills in his 1951 book white collar the american middle classes the new entrepreneur was a lone wolf able to succeed in post world war ii corporate america by elusively meandering through various institutions during this time anthology writers such as rod serling reginald rose and paddy chayefsky achieved a level of creativity that has rarely been equaled on television since yet despite their success anthology writers still needed to evade the constraints and censorship of 50s television in order to stay true to their creative powers and political visions thus they worked as new entrepreneurs who adapted their more controversial scripts for the hollywood broadway and book publishing industries even after the television networks cancelled their prestigious anthology series at the end of the 50s the most resilient writers were able to redefine what it meant to be entrepreneurs by launching cutting edge shows such as the twilight zone and the defenders that are still popular today the new entrepreneurs includes detailed textual analysis of legendary sometimes hard to find television anthology scripts that have received only cursory glances in television history until now ebook edition note all images have been redacted

this book explores the effectiveness of the workshop in the creative writing classroom and looks beyond the question of whether or not the workshop works to address the issue of what an altered pedagogical model might look like in visualising what else is possible in the workshop space the sixteen chapters collected in does the writing workshop still work cover a range of theoretical and pedagogical topics and explore the inner workings and conflicts of the workshop model the needs of a growing and diverse student population are central to

the chapter authors consideration of non normative pedagogies the book is a must read for all teachers of creative writing as well as for researchers in creative writing studies

this open access collection of essays examines the literary advice industry since its emergence in anglo american literary culture in the mid nineteenth century within the context of the professionalization of the literary field and the continued debate on creative writing as art and craft often dismissed as commercial and stereotypical by authors and specialists alike literary advice has nonetheless remained a flourishing business embodying the unquestioned values of a literary system but also functioning as a sign of a literary system in transition exploring the rise of new online amateur writing cultures in the twenty first century this collection of essays considers how literary advice proliferates globally leading to new forms and genres

published between 2015 and 2016 in on military memoirs esmeralda kleinreesink offers insight into military books who were their writers and publishers what were their plots and what motives did their authors have for writing them every afghanistan war autobiography published in the us the uk germany canada and the netherlands between 2001 and 2010 is compared quantitatively and qualitatively on military memoirs shows that soldier authors are a special breed that self published books still cater to different markets than traditionally published ones that cultural differences are clearly visible between warrior nations and non warrior nations that not every contemporary memoir is a disillusionment story and that writing is serious business for soldiers wanting to change the world the book provides an innovative example of how to use interdisciplinary mixed method cross cultural research to analyse egodocuments

provides a history and criticism of an important disrupting force in early science fiction television programming in this tv milestone author joanne morreale highlights the differences of the outer limits abc 1963 65 from typical programs on the air in the 1960s morreale argues that the show provides insight into changes in the television industry as writers turned to genre fiction in this case a hybrid of science fiction and horror to provide veiled social commentary the show illustrates the tension between networks who wanted mainstream entertainment and the independent writer producers leslie stevens and joseph stefano who wanted to use the medium to challenge viewers in five chapters the outer limitsmakes a case for the show s deployment of gothic melodrama and science fiction tropes unique televisual characteristics and creative adaptation of many cultural sources to interrogate the relationship between humans and technology in a way that continues to influence contemporary debate in such shows as star trek the x files and black mirror underlying the arguments is the eerie notion of the outer limitsas a disruptive force on television at the time purposely making audiences uncomfortable for example in its iconic opening credit sequence a disembodied control voice claims to be taking over the television as images mimic signal interference other themes convey cold war paranoia ambivalence

about the kennedy era new frontier and anxiety about the burgeoning military industrial governmental complex the book points out that the outer limits presaged what came to be known as quality television while most episodes followed the lowbrow tradition of televised science fiction by adapting previously published stories and films the series elevated the genre by rearticulating it through themes and images drawn from myth literature and the art film the outer limits is lucid yet accessible well researched and argued with enlightening discussions of specific episodes even as it gives attention to broader television history and theory it will be of special interest to scholars and students of television and media studies as well as fans of science fiction

in a famous passage in *A Room of One's Own* virginia woolf asked why women did not write poetry in the elizabethan age she went on to speculate about an imaginary judith shakespeare who might have been destined for a career as illustrious as that of her brother william except that she had none of his chances the truth is that many women wrote during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries and this collection will serve to introduce modern readers to the full variety of women's writing in this period from poems prose and fiction to prophecies letters tracts and philosophy the collection begins with the poetry of isabella whitney who worked in a gentlewoman's household in london in the late 1560s and ends with aphra behn who was employed as a spy in amsterdam by charles ii here are examples of the work of twelve women writers allowing the reader to sample the diverse and lively output of all classes and opinions from artistcrats such as mary wroth anne clifford and margaret cavendish to women of obscure background caught up in the religious ferment of the mid seventeenth century like hester biddle priscilla cotton and mary cole the collection includes three plays and a generous selection of poetry letters diary prose fiction religious polemic prohecy and scienticficic speculation offering the reader the possibility of tracing patterns through the works collected and some sense of historical shifts and changes all the extracts are edited afresh from original sources and the anthology includes comprehensive notes both explanatory and textual about the series for over 100 years oxford world s
