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from dial up to wi fi an engaging cultural history of the commercial web industry in the 1990s the world wide helped transform the internet from the domain of computer scientists to a playground for mass audiences as urls leapt off computer screens and onto cereal boxes billboards and film trailers the web changed the way many americans experienced media socialized and interacted with brands businesses rushed online to set up corporate home pages and as a result a new cultural industry was born web design for today s internet users who are more familiar sharing social media posts than collecting hotlists of cool sites the early web may seem primitive clunky and graphically inferior after the dot com bubble burst in 2000 this pre crash era was dubbed 1.0 a retronym meant to distinguish the early web from the social user centered and participatory values that were embodied in the internet industry s resurgence as 2.0 in the 21st century tracking shifts in the rules of good web design ankerson reimagines speculation and design as a series of contests and collaborations to conceive the boundaries of a new digitally networked future what was it like to go online and surf the in the 1990s how and why did the look and feel of the web change over time how do new design

paradigms like user experience design ux gain traction bringing together media studies internet studies and design theory dot com design traces the shifts in and struggles over the web s production aesthetics and design to provide a comprehensive look at the evolution of the web industry and into the vast internet we browse today

activism on the examines the everyday tensions that political activists face as they come to terms with the increasingly commercialized nature of web technologies and sheds light on an important yet under investigated dimension of the relationship between contemporary forms of social protest and internet technologies drawing on anthropological and ethnographic research amongst three very different political groups in the uk italy and spain the book argues that activists everyday internet uses are largely defined by processes of negotiation with digital capitalism these processes of negotiation are giving rise to a series of collective experiences which are defined by the tension between activists democratic needs on one side and the cultural processes reinforced by digital capitalism on the other in looking at the encounter between activist cultures and digital capitalism the book focuses in particular on the tension created by self centered communication processes and networked individualism by corporate surveillance and data mining and by fast capitalism and the temporality of immediacy activism on the suggests that if we want to understand how new technologies are affecting political participation and democratic processes we should not focus on disruption and novelty but we should instead explore the complex dialectics between digital discourses and digital practices between the technical and the social between the political economy of the web and its lived critique

collective political projects have become ephemeral and are subject to radical forms of erasure through cooptation division redefinition or intimidation in present times media and utopia responds to the resulting crisis of the social by investigating the links between mediation and political imagination this volume addresses those utopian spaces historically constituted through media and analyses the conditions that made them possible individual essays deal with non western histories of technopolitics through distinctive perspectives on how to conceive the relationship between social form everyday life and utopian possibility and by examining a range of media formats and genres from print sound and film to new media with contributions from major scholars in the field this book will be of interest to researchers and scholars of media studies culture studies sociology modern south asian history and politics
