since its original publication in 1978 delirious new york has attained mythic status back in print in a newly designed edition this influential cultural architectural and social history of new york is even more popular selling out its first printing on publication rem koolhaas's celebration and analysis of new york depicts the city as a metaphor for the incredible variety of human behavior at the end of the nineteenth century population information and technology explosions made manhattan a laboratory for the invention and testing of a metropolitan lifestyle the culture of congestion and its architecture manhattan he writes is the 20th century's rosetta stone occupied by architectural mutations central park the skyscraper utopian fragments rockefeller center the un building and irrational phenomena radio city music hall koolhaas interprets and reinterprets the dynamic relationship between architecture and culture in a number of telling episodes of new york's history including the imposition of the manhattan grid the creation of coney island and the development of the skyscraper delirious new york is also packed with intriguing and fun facts and illustrated with witty watercolors and quirky archival drawings photographs postcards and maps the spirit of this visionary investigation of manhattan equals the energy of the city itself

this second volume of the landmark architectural theory anthology surveys the development of architectural theory from the franco prussian war of 1871 until the end of the twentieth century the entire two volume anthology follows the full range of architectural literature from classical times to present transformations an ambitious anthology bringing together over 300 classic and contemporary essays that survey the key developments and trends in architecture spans the period from 1871 to 2005 from john ruskin and the arts and crafts movement in great britain through to the development of lingang new city and the creation of a metropolis in the east china sea organized thematically featuring general and section introductions and headnotes to each essay written by a renowned expert on architectural theory places the work of starchitects like koolhaas eisenman and lyn alongside the work of prominent architectural critics offering a balanced perspective on current debates includes many hard to find texts and works never previously translated into english alongside volume i an anthology from vitruvius to 1870 creates a stunning overview of architectural theory from early antiquity to the twenty first century

an anthology of the pivotal theoretical texts that have defined architecture culture in the late twentieth century in the discussion of architecture there is a prevailing sentiment that since 1968 cultural production in its traditional sense can no longer be understood to rise spontaneously as a matter of social course but must now be constructed through ever more self conscious theoretical procedures the development of interpretive modes of various stripes post structuralist marxian phenomenological psychoanalytic as well as others dissenting or eccentric has given scholars a range of tools for rethinking architecture in relation to other fields and for reasserting architectures general importance in intellectual discourse this anthology presents forty seven of the primary texts of architecture theory introducing each with an explication of the concepts and categories necessary for its understanding and evaluation it also presents twelve documents of projects or events that had major theoretical repercussions for the period several of the essays appear here in english for the first time

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the use of new media in the service of cultural heritage is a fast growing field known variously as virtual or digital heritage new heritage under this denomination broadens the definition of the field to address the complexity of cultural heritage such as the related social political and economic issues this book is a collection of 20 key essays of authors from 11 countries representing a wide range of professions including architecture philosophy history cultural heritage management new media museology and computer science which examine the application of new media to cultural heritage from a different points of view issues surrounding heritage interpretation to the public and the attempts to capture the essence of both tangible buildings monuments and intangible customs rituals cultural heritage are investigated in a series of innovative case studies
