psychology a behavioral overview is an introductory text with an orienting perspective that is frankly behavioral rather than eclectic this focus is made quite clear in the first chapter of the book but in the remainder it also becomes clear that such a focus permits coverage of most of the topics found in the more common introductory text actually the next five chapters dealing with psychology as a science methodology evolution physiology and learning are in many ways comparable to the treatments provided in more eclectic introductory texts the behavioral focus and the departure from traditional approaches become most significant in the last six chapters which deal with traditional psychological topics e g language child development and personality but deal with them systematically in terms of the concepts and principles introduced in the chapters on evolution and physiology and especially in the chapter on learning using the concepts provided early in the text to interpret complex aspects of human behavior provides valuable justification for those concepts as well as an opportunity for improved understanding of them although students will not make extensive contact with the variety of the theoretical approaches found in the typical text they will become especially competent in the use of behavioral concepts and principles to interpret and understand many of the topics of traditional importance in psychology

which can deal with problems such as consciousness that have been either ignored evaded or muddled by existing approaches this new behaviorism provides a unified framework for the science of behavior that can be applied both to the laboratory and to broader practical issues such as law and punishment the health care system and teaching

this book summarizes theoretical and empirical work that was performed in a large scale cross university research project on the relationship between attitudes and behavior the entire program has been funded by the deutsche forschungsgemeinschaft dfg an institution that operates similarly to the american national science foundation in 1981 the dfgruled to release the project for a five year period with the option to extend if th extension proposal would suggest a major alteration of research goals the participants are presently in the stage

of transition between the first five year allotment and the granted extension we feel that this is the most opportune time to summarize the development of the project for an international audience until now only scattered publications have existed this book is more than just a compilation of previously published results rather it is the original contributions and a substantial share of newly published empirical results that guarantee an up to date exposition of the entire program the general goal of the research group is to perform basic research in attaining explanations for the relationships between attitude and behavior and to improve the predictability of current predictor models in pursuing this goal we are not primarily interested in the immediate strategy of redefining predictor variables within the framework of the general linear statistical model rather we emphasize cognitive processes and structures that predispose a person's behavior that accompany behavior or that change as a result of prior behavior
