this clear student friendly text offers a step by step introduction to the use of spss easily the most widely used data analysis computer package in the social sciences supported by four datasets taken from the well known british social attitudes survey on the topics crime health politics and poverty it offers an eminently practical approach to its subject while still setting its explanation of statistical procedures within the wider social research context

accessible and practical overview to help social researchers make the most of information technology in relation to research design and selection management and analysis of research data the book pinpoints current and future trends in computer assisted methods this book is intended for postgraduate and undergraduate social research methods courses and professional social researchers in sociology social policy and administration social psychology and geography particular appeal to courses in computer applications for social scientists and researchers

the essays presented in this volume examine knowledge mobilisation and its relation to research impact and engagement the social sciences matter because they can help us to understand and address the complex challenges confronting society this is particularly true in an era of significant downward pressure on public expenditure a consequence of the global fiscal crisis when there is a striking need to ensure that policies are demonstrably effective and efficient the impact agenda in the uk reflected in parallel global debates actively encourages the social sciences to make and demonstrate a difference to justify and protect social science funding this volume shows how knowledge mobilisation can be thought of systematically as a process encompassing engagement leading to the co production and channelling of knowledge to make a difference in the economy and society this book was originally published as a special issue of contemporary social science

what is the relationship between the social sciences and the natural sciences where do today's dominant approaches to doing social science come from what are the main fissures and debates in contemporary social scientific thought how are we to make sense of seemingly contrasting approaches to how social scientists find out about the world and justify their claims to have knowledge of it in this exciting handbook ian jarvie and jesús zamora bonilla have put together a wide ranging and authoritative overview of the main philosophical

currents and traditions at work in the social sciences today starting with the history of social scientific thought this handbook sets out to explore that core fundamentals of social science practice from issues of ontology and epistemology to issues of practical method along the way it investigates such notions as paradigm empiricism postmodernism naturalism language agency power culture and causality bringing together in one volume leading authorities in the field from around the world this book will be a must have for any serious scholar or student of the social sciences

according to their critics social scientists rarely ask the right questions and cannot provide satisfactory answers even to the questions they ask themselves social scientists often discuss the nature of knowledge in their fields with a notable lack of clarity explanation and experience in social science by robert brown dispels the confusion with cogency and wit it is a systematic sensible and lucid analysis of the nature of the explanations put forward by social scientists explanation making is first distinguished from describing and reporting and then classified into different types based on different kinds of information used the greater part of the book consists in discussion and examination of these types of explanation and their relationships in which the usefulness and limitations of each are assessed an extraordinary variety of examples from contemporary work in all the social sciences is used including the fields of sociology anthropology psychology history demography political science and economics the author makes it clear that good social explanation is possible and that it conforms to the requirements of all good scientific explanation explanation and experience in social science is of interest to the practicing scientist in fact it is a must have for any personal or public library with collections in the social sciences most studies in the philosophy of the sciences natural and social fall into two distinct groups those written by philosophers for other philosophers and those produced by scientists for their fellow scientists the aim of this book is to discuss questions of philosophical interest as they come to be imbedded in the work of social scientists

the culmination of a lifetime spent in a variety of fields sociology anthropology economics psychology and philosophy of science how does social science work takes an innovative sometimes iconoclastic look at social scientists at work in many disciplines it describes how they investigate and the kinds of truth they produce illuminating the weaknesses and dangers inherent in their research at once an analysis a critique and a synthesis this major study begins by surveying philosophical approaches to hermeneutics to examine the question of how social science ought to work it illustrates many of its arguments with untraditional examples such as the reception of the work of the political biographer robert caro to show the hermeneutical problems of ethnographers the major part of the book

surveys sociological political and psychological studies of social science to get a rounded picture of how social science works paul diesling warns that social science exists between two opposite kinds of degeneration a value free professionalism that lives only for publications that show off the latest techniques and a deep social concern that uses science for propaganda he argues for greater self awareness and humility among social scientists although he notes that some social scientists will angrily reject the thought that their personality affects their research in any way this profound and sometimes witty book will appeal to students and practitioners in the social sciences who are ready to take a fresh look at their field an extensive bibliography provides a wealth of references across an array of social science disciplines

becoming a social science researcher is designed to help aspiring social scientists including credentialed scholars understand the formidable complexities of the research process instead of explaining specific research techniques it concentrates on the philosophical sociological and psychological dimensions of social research these dimensions have received little coverage in guides written for social science researchers but they are arguably even more important than particular analytical techniques truly sophisticated social science scholarship requires that researchers understand the intellectual and social contexts in which they collect and interpret information while social science training in us graduate schools has become more systematic over the past two decades graduate training and published guidance still fall short in addressing this fundamental need

how the nsf became an important yet controversial patron for the social sciences influencing debates over their scientific status and social relevance in the early cold war years the u s government established the national science foundation nsf a civilian agency that soon became widely known for its dedication to supporting first rate science the agency s 1950 enabling legislation made no mention of the social sciences although it included a vague reference to other sciences nevertheless as mark solovey shows in this book the nsf also soon became a major albeit controversial source of public funding for them

new approach demonstrating how social science can be successful focusing on context values and power

written for social science students who will be working with or conducting research mathematics for social scientists offers a non intimidating approach to learning or reviewing

math skills essential in quantitative research methods the text is designed to build students confidence by presenting material in a conversational tone and using a wealth of clear and applied examples author jonathan kropko argues that mastering these concepts will break students reliance on using basic models in statistical software allowing them to engage with research data beyond simple software calculations

with examples drawn from throughout the behavioral sciences how to think like a social scientist fosters careful critical thinking about psychology and the social sciences throughout the text pettigrew encourages readers to apply newly developed critical thinking skills to the nature of theory comparisons and control cause and change sampling and selection varying levels of analysis and systems thinking in the social sciences

in late nineteenth century german academic circles the term *verstehen* literally understanding or comprehension came to be associated with the view that social phenomena must be understood from the point of view of the social actor advocates of this approach were opposed by positivists who stressed the unity of method between the social and natural sciences and an external experimental and quantitative knowledge although modified over time the dispute between positivists and antipositivists nowadays called naturalists and antinaturalists has persisted and still defines many debates in the field of philosophy of social sciences in this volume michael martin offers a critical appraisal of *verstehen* as a method of verification and discovery as well as a necessary condition for understanding in its strongest forms *verstehen* entails subjectively reliving the experience of the social actor or at least rethinking his or her thoughts while in its weaker forms it only involves reconstructing the rationale for acting martin s opening chapter offers a reconsideration of the debate between the classical *verstehen* theorists wilhelm dilthey max weber r g collingwood and the positivists chapters 2 and 3 deal with positivist critiques of *verstehen* as a method of social scientific verification and understanding in the subsequent chapters martin considers contemporary varieties of the *verstehen* position and argues that they like the classical positions they conflict with the pluralistic nature of social science chapter 4 discusses peter winch s and william dray s variants of *verstehen* while chapters 5 through 9 consider recent theorists karl popper charles taylor clifford geertz whose work can be characterized in *verstehenist* terms in his conclusion martin defines the limitations of the classical and recent *verstehen* positions and proposes a methodological pluralism in which *verstehen* is justified pragmatically in terms of the purposes and contexts of inquiry this

volume is the only comprehensive and sustained critique of verstehen theory currently available it will be of interest to sociologists philosophers political scientists and anthropologists
