this book attempts to re think the purpose of the great pyramid of the giza plateau which are commonly thought to be the tombs of pharaohs the first part examines the great pyramid s architectural

features construction details and internal structure referencing experts and historical figures such as professor wm flinders petrie colonel howard vyse piazzi smyth herodotus irving finkel brothers john and morton edgar jimmy dunn giovanni battista caviglia giovanni battista belzoni and many others this portion of the book closely examines peculiarities of the internal floorplan of the great pyramid and signs of destruction found in its internal rooms and passageways in the second part of the book the author attempts to re interpret ancient sumerian scripts and unexpectedly finds sumerian names for the apartments and the passageways of the great pyramid including descriptions and dimensions which have not yet been noted in any historical document the sumerian chronicles contain not only a description of the events that caused destruction inside the great pyramid traces of which were discovered by modern researchers and described in the first part of the book but also the process of building the great pyramid itself the author finds symbols of the internal structure of the great pyramid reflected in other archaeological artifacts such as the greenstone seal of adda additionally he finds details in the description of the hanging gardens of babylon considering the construction and functionality of the grand gallery he discovers an unexpected relationship between the great pyramid and its chambers and the images of egyptian gods such as isis serapis geb nut nephtys and others the book presents the reader with an entirely new understanding of images of the ancient gods which symbolically describe the functionality of the great pyramid it also highlights the great pyramid's central role in the development of human civilization although this book uses technical terms and references ancient sumerian texts it is written in order to be accessible to the common reader

influence from mesopotamia on adjacent civilizations has often been proposed on the basis of scattered similarities for the first time a wide ranging assessment from 3000 bc to the middle ages investigates how similarities arose in egypt palestine anatolia and greece the development of writing for accountancy astronomy divination and belles lettres emanated from mesopotamians who took their academic traditions into countries beyond their political control each country soon transformed what it received into its own individual culture when cuneiform writing disappeared babylonian cults and literature now in aramaic and greek flourished during the roman empire the manichaeans adapted the old traditions which then perished under persecution but traces persist in hermetic works

court narratives and romances and in the arabian nights when ancient mesopotamia was rediscovered in the last century british scholars were at the forefront of international research public excitement has been reflected in pictures and poems films and fashion

ancient kings who did not honor the gods overlooked an indispensable means for ruling effectively in their communities in many traditional societies royal authority was regarded as a divine gift bestowed according to the quality of the relationship of the king both to god or the gods and to the people the tension and the harmony within these human and divine relationships demanded that the king repeatedly strive to integrate the community s piety with his political strategies this fascinating study explores the relationship between religion and royal authority in three of history s most influential civilizations homeric greece biblical israel and old babylonian mesopotamia dale launderville identifies similar contrasting and analogous ways that piety functioned in these distinct cultures to legitimate the rule of particular kings and promote community well being key to this religiopolitical dynamic was the use of royal rhetoric which necessarily took the form of political theology by examining a host of ancient texts and drawing on the insights of philosophers poets historians anthropologists social theorists and theologians launderville shows how kings increased their status the more they demonstrated through their speech and actions that they ruled on behalf of god or the gods launderville s work also sheds light on a number of perennial questions about ancient political life how could the people call the king to account did the people forfeit too much of their freedom and initiative by giving obedience to a king who symbolized their unity as a community how did the religious traditions serve as a check on the king s power and keep alive the voice of the people this study in comparative political theology elucidates these engaging concerns from multiple perspectives making piety and politics of interest to readers in fields ranging from biblical studies and theology to ancient history and political science
