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inspired by history our story is a beautifully illustrated collection of original stories from some of canada s most celebrated aboriginal writers asked to explore seminal moments in canadian history from an aboriginal perspective these ten acclaimed authors have travelled through our country s past to discover the moments that shaped our nation and its people drawing on their skills as gifted

storytellers and the unique perspectives their heritage affords the contributors to this collection offer wonderfully imaginative accounts of what it s like to participate in history from a tale of viking raiders to a story set during the oka crisis the authors tackle a wide range of issues and events taking us into the unknown while also bringing the familiar into sharper focus our story brings together an impressive array of voices inuk cherokee ojibway cree and salish to name just a few from across the country and across the spectrum of first nations these are the novelists playwrights journalists activists and artists whose work is both aboriginal and uniquely canadian brought together to explore and articulate their peoples experience of our country s shared history these authors grace insight and humour help all canadians understand the forces and experiences that have made us who we are maria campbell tantoo cardinal tomson highway drew hayden taylor basil johnston thomas king brian maracle lee maracle jovette marchessault rachel qitsualik

this book examines race relations in australia through various media representations over the past 200 years the early colonial press perpetuated the image of aboriginal people as framed by early explorers and stereotypes and assumptions still prevail print and television news accounts of several key events in recent australian history are compared and reveal how indigenous sources are excluded from stories about their affairs journalists wield extraordinary power in shaping the images of cultures and people so indigenous people like those in north america have turned away from mainstream media and have acquired their own means of cultural production through radio television and multimedia this study concludes with suggestions for addressing media practices to reconcile indigenous and non indigenous people this study will appeal to students and scholars studying mass media particularly journalism and public relations australian history and sociology

this volume raises questions about why oral celebrations of language receive so little attention in published literary histories when they are simultaneously recognized as fundamental to our understanding of literature it aims to prompt debate regarding the transformations needed for literary historians to provide a

more balanced and fuller appreciation of what we call literature one that acknowledges the interdependence of oral storytelling and written expression whether in print pictorial or digital form rather than offering a summary of current theories or prescribing solutions this volume brings together distinguished scholars conventional literary historians and oral performer practitioners from regions as diverse as south africa the canadian arctic the roma communities of eastern europe and the music industry of the american west in a conversation that engages the reader directly with the problems that they have encountered and the questions that they have explored in their work with orality and with literary history

there has been a growing interest in the role of arts and cultural practice in tackling perennial forms of social exclusion marginalization and oppression researchers and educators from different disciplines have been collaborating with community based agencies and community groups to forge new ways to challenge these forms of exclusion this volume discusses how various social actors work in interdisciplinary and cross institutional ways to push an agenda that privileges those individuals and groups who experience and live at the front line of social inequality discrimination racism and oppression for instance what new understandings are generated through creative interdisciplinary action oriented work and the implications for social action and transformation how are community pedagogies constructed and communicated through arts based research contemporary and innovative mediums such as creative performances arts technologies mixed cultural practices and social media and networking this collection of articles blurs the lines between cultural practice and knowledge production with the process and products coming in the forms of theories creative methodologies and a range of arts together these act as powerful pedagogical tools for engaging in social justice and transformative work the contributions further highlight the multifaceted and diverse ways of creating and disseminating knowledge and the attempts to decenter text based ways of communicating in hopes of sharing collaborative knowledge beyond the academy and engaging the public this volume was originally published as a special issue of the international

the routledge handbook of sport history is a new and innovative survey of the discipline of sport history global in scope it examines the key contemporary issues in sports historiography sheds light on previously ignored topics and sets an intellectual agenda for the future development of the discipline the book explores both traditional and non traditional methodologies in sport history and traces the interface between sport history and other fields of research such as literature material culture and the digital humanities it considers the importance of key issues such as gender race sexuality and politics to our understanding of sport history and focuses on innovative ways that the scholarship around these issues is challenging accepted discourses this is the first handbook to include a full section on indigenous sport history a topic that has often been ignored in sport history surveys despite its powerful upstream influence on contemporary sport the book also reflects carefully on the central importance of sport history journals in shaping the development of the discipline this book is an essential reference for any student researcher or scholar with an interest in sport history or the relationship between sport and society it will also be fascinating reading for any historians looking for fresh perspectives on contemporary historiography or social and cultural history

where does our sense of identity and belonging come from how does culture produce and challenge identities identity and culture looks at how different cultural narratives and practices work to constitute identity for individuals and groups in multi ethnic □ postcolonial □ societies uses examples from history politics fiction and the visual to examine the social power relations that create subject positions and forms of identity analyses how cultural texts and practices offer new forms of identity and agency that subvert dominant ideologies this book encompasses issues of class race and gender with a particular focus on the mobilization of forms of ethnic identity in societies still governed by racism it a key text for students in cultural studies sociology of culture literary studies history race and ethnicity studies media and film studies and gender studies

the first nations of canada have survived many cultural onslaughts since european contact however they still face a myriad of socioeconomic educational and legal challenges if they are to experience socioeconomic success in the twenty first century western canadian native destiny examines a series of watershed issues that remain on the order paper for canada s aboriginal people it is important for all canadians aboriginal and non aboriginal to understand these issues if they are to lend support to the first people s quest for justice and equality in this prosperous nation headlining the list of unresolved matters is the public s lack of

understanding of indigenous knowledge and spirituality which form the basis of first nations needs and demands this discussion is followed by examining native urban migrations health education and welfare needs residential school aftermath cultural identity and indian self image language maintenance role of women status of aboriginal art function of aboriginal leadership land claims economic development the challenge of aboriginal self government and the quest for social justice
