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how insights from the social sciences including social psychology and economics can improve the design of online communities online communities are among the most popular destinations on the internet but not all online communities are equally successful for every flourishing facebook there is a moribund friendster not to mention the scores of smaller social networking sites that never attracted enough members to be viable this book offers lessons

from theory and empirical research in the social sciences that can help improve the design of online communities the authors draw on the literature in psychology economics and other social sciences as well as their own research translating general findings into useful design claims they explain for example how to encourage information contributions based on the theory of public goods and how to build members commitment based on theories of interpersonal bond formation for each design claim they offer supporting evidence from theory experiments or observational studies

for seven years a collaboration between the institute for medieval studies of the austrian academy of sciences and the universities of utrecht cambridge leeds and paris i sorbonne provided the opportunity for young researchers to discuss and coordinate their work the title of the project and of this volume texts and identities provides the framework for case studies in different fields of early medieval history they include apparently disparate topics such as historiography and hagiography monastic spaces and memories lay and ecclesiastic legislation as well as liturgy and penance rather than defining a common field of research the meetings from which these papers have emerged derived their coherence from their common methodological framework this approach combines two elements on the one hand emphasis has been laid on the careful analysis of the transmission of texts and of the manuscript evidence on the other research has focused on the problem of identity or rather of processes of identification including the perception of differences between specific social political and religious communities in the combination of these two approaches the extant texts from the early medieval period are not only seen as mere reflections of ethnic social and cultural identities but also as media that gave meaning to social practices and were often intended to inspire guide change or prevent action directly or indirectly the written texts that have been transmitted to us can be seen as part of a cultural effort to shape the present by means of restructuring the past the often discordant voices of medieval authors allow modern historians to grasp something of the multiplicity of the early medieval world and of the disagreements conflicts idiosyncrasies and individual perceptions among the people who lived in that period many contributions in this volume propose specific methods for studying changing identities they analyse differences between similar texts over time or specifically changes in texts in the course of their transmission the papers collected in this volume illustrate that texts were integral parts of a world in transformation

this handbook begins with a foundational overview of rural education examining the ways in which definitions histories policies and demographic changes influence rural schools this foundational approach includes how corporatization population changes poverty and the role of data affect everyday learning in rural schools in following sections the contributors consider how school closures charter schools and district governance influence decision making in rural schooling while also examining the influence of these structures on higher education attainment rural school partnerships and school leadership they explore curriculum studies in rural education including place based and trauma informed pedagogies rural literacies rural stereotype threat and achievement finally they engage with issues of identity and equity in rural schools by providing an overview of the literature related to diverse populations in rural places including indigenous black and latinx communities and exceptional learners

importantly this handbook applies theoretical tools to rural classroom experiences demonstrating the potential of work centered at the intersection of theory rurality and classroom practice each section concludes with a response by an international scholar situating the topics covered within the broader global context

this is an assessment of the social dimension to reconciliation as displayed in paul s letter to the romans traditional exegetical scholarship has treated paul s presentation of reconciliation as referring to reconciliation between people and god and has primarily focused use of the word katallage traditionally translated as atonement constantineanu challenges this view and argues that paul s understanding of the concept is more complex employing rich symbolism to describe reconciliation with god and between human beings forming together an inseparable reality the discussion is placed within paul s overall religious social and political contexts showing that an analysis of the social dimension of reconciliation in his thought is both plausible and necessary constantineanu offers an analysis of two major sections of romans chapters 5 8 and 12 15 special emphasis is placed on paul s use of the story of jesus for community formation for the shaping of identity values and community practices it is thus demonstrated that for paul god s reconciling initiative shown in the crucifixion is not only the pronouncement of god s reconciling the world but also the ground and model for reconciliation among human beings it was formerly the journal for the study of the new testament supplement a book series that explores the many aspects of new testament study including historical perspectives social scientific and literary theory and theological cultural and contextual approaches
