Warren incorporate essential historical, contemporary and literary perspectives on black cultural criticism to explore the full portrait of racial injustice and inequality in America. Taking up such topics as the evolving politics of New Orleans before and after Hurricane Katrina and novels by Toni Morrison and Colson Whitehead, this book engages with the black radical tradition, Afro-pessimism, antiblackness, race reductionism and other key theories and concepts in contemporary black studies, challenging the prevailing assertion that longstanding white animus against nonwhite peoples sufficiently and adequately explains deepening injustice. Past injustice or present inequality, the essays argue, that such thinking fails to fully explain America's past and leaves us ill-equipped to handle the continuing challenges in the present. Tracing black cultural criticism across the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, this book will appeal to students, scholars and researchers of black studies, race and ethnic studies and contemporary and black American literature.

Elizabeth Freeman expands biopolitical and queer theory by outlining a temporal view of the long nineteenth century and showing how time became a social and sensory means by which people resisted disciplinary regimes and assembled into groups in ways that created new forms of sociality.

in this provocative and original exploration of racial subjugation during slavery and its aftermath saidiya hartman illumines the forms of terror and resistance that shaped black identity scenes of subjection examines the forms of domination that usually go undetected in particular the encroachments of power that take place through notions of humanity enjoyment protection rights and consent by looking at slave narratives plantation diaries popular theater slave performance freedmen s primers and legal cases hartman investigates a wide variety of scenes ranging from the auction block and minstrel show to the staging of the self possessed and rights bearing individual of freedom while attentive to the performance of power the terrible spectacles of slaveholders dominion and the innocent amusements designed to abase and pacify the enslaved and the entanglements of pleasure and terror in these displays of mastery hartman also examines the possibilities for resistance redress and transformation embodied in black performance and everyday practice this important study contends that despite the legal abolition of slavery emergent notions of individual will and responsibility revealed the tragic continuities between slavery and freedom bold and persuasively argued scenes of subjection will engage readers in a broad range of historical literary and cultural studies

this edited collection applies theories and lessons from the study of antiblack racism to the study of migration and movement it locates often hidden legacies resonances and influences of antiblackness in contemporary migratory regimes

possibility of witnessing drawing on black studies continental  
philosophy queer theory experimental poetics and work by  
several writers and artists zolf asks what it means to witness  
from the excessive incalculable position of no one in a  
fragmentary and recursive style that enacts the monstrous  
speech it pursues no one s witness demonstrates the necessity  
of confronting the nazi holocaust in relation to transatlantic  
slavery and its afterlives thinking along with black feminist  
theory s notions of entangled swarm field plenum chorus no one  
s witness interrogates the limits and thresholds of witnessing  
its dangerous perhaps no one operates outside the bounds of  
the sovereign individual hauntologically informed by the  
fleshly no thingness that has been historically ascribed to  
blackness and that blackness enacts within apposite to and  
beyond the no one no one bears witness to becomings beyond  
comprehension making and unmaking monstrous forms of entangled  
future anterior life

tying together legal historical social political and literary  
strands to show how the law itself was implicated in the  
persistence of slavery this work sheds new light on slavery  
and southern history as it probes the conscience of a troubled  
jurist incapable of fully transcending his times

looking at texts including jean toomer s cane toni morrison s  
beloved james baldwin s another country and beat poetry by bob  
kaufmann this work describes the phenomena of haunting  
displacement and ghostliness as endemic to modern african  
american literature and culture
