axel honneth has been instrumental in advancing the work of the frankfurt school of critical theorists rebuilding their effort to combine radical social and political analysis with rigorous philosophical inquiry these eleven essays reclaim the relevant themes of the frankfurt school which counted theodor w adorno max horkheimer walter benjamin jürgen habermas franz neumann and albrecht wellmer as members they also engage with kant freud alexander mitscherlich and michael walzer whose work on morality history democracy and individuality intersects with the frankfurt school s core concerns collected here for the first time in english honneth s essays pursue the unifying themes and theses that support the methodologies and thematics of critical social theory and they address the possibilities of continuing this tradition through radically changed theoretical and social conditions according to honneth there is a unity that underlies critical theory s multiple approaches the way in which reason is both distorted and furthered in contemporary capitalist society and while much is dead in the social and psychological doctrines of critical social theory its central inquiries remain vitally relevant is social progress still possible after the horrors of the twentieth century does capitalism deform reason and if so in what respects can we justify the relationship between law and violence in secular terms or is it inextricably bound to divine justice how can we be free when we re subject to socialization in a highly complex and in many respects unfree society for honneth suffering and moral struggle are departure points for a new reconstructive form of social criticism one that is based solidly in the empirically grounded interdisciplinary approach of the frankfurt school

this important study of the relationship between historical developments and the work of the scholars associated with the frankfurt institute for social research yields fascinating insights into the actual workings of the institute and the relationships among its members the book has already had a major impact in germany where it has opened up the subject for argument and analysis by a new generation of scholars theory and politics first explores the effect of political experience on the process of theory construction from 1930 to 1945 the central figure in this examination is max horkheimer whose work is seen as the key to the shift in the frankfurt school s focus from materialism to critical theory to a critique of instrumental reason within each of the three periods defined by these foci the author examines external historical

political events including the school's emigration to america and their reflection in the group's changing conception of the relation of theory to practice as well as in its detailed theoretical position along the way he helps to clarify such questions as the schools's evolving attitudes toward the soviet union fascism science and the desired utopia the book then examines what may have been the strongest stage of critical theory the program for interdisciplinary research that emerged in the early 1930s the author acutely portrays horkheimer's conception of a synthesis between philosophy and empirical social science that would result in a form of social research relevant to the central problems of the day as martin jay notes in his foreword helmut dubiel has become not only an analyst of critical theory but a gifted contributor to its ongoing reception and development he is currently a research fellow at the university of frankfurt theory and politics is included in the series studies in contemporary german social thought edited by thomas mccarthy

in this book the term critical theory has a double meaning author george snedecker refers to both the work of the frankfurt school and other neomarxist social theorists as well as any recent work in literary criticism using critical theory snedecker explores the continuing relevance of new marxist social and political theory he provides an evaluation of the contributions to contemporary social theory of the main figures of western marxism including gerog lukacs edward w said raymond williams jürgen habermas and oliver c cox

this book offers a unique and timely reading of the early frankfurt school in response to the recent affective turn within the arts and humanities resisting the overly rationalist tendencies of political philosophy it argues that critical theory actively cultivates a powerful connection between thinking and feeling and rediscovers a range of often neglected concepts that were of vital importance to the first generation of critical theorists including melancholia hope un happiness objects and mimesis in doing so it brings the dynamic work of walter benjamin theodor adorno ernst bloch and siegfried kracauer into conversation with more recent debates around politics and affect an important intervention in the fields of affect studies and social and political thought critical theory and feeling shows that sensuous experience is at the heart of the frankfurt school's affective politics
